This question was asked three times, and the same answer was repeated three times. The fourth time the question was asked, Rasulullah المنافية replied, "Your father." The emphasis on respecting mothers is due to the difficulties they go through during pregnancy, childbirth, and nurturing the child. Mothers are generally more compassionate than others and are their children's first teachers, teaching them Islamic manners and education. The Prophet المنافية said, "The pleasure of the Lord is in the pleasure of the parent." Therefore, gaining our parents' love and avoiding their anger is crucial.







Outstanding Examples of Mothers

In Islam, numerous examples of ideal mothers are found in the Qur'an and the Seerah. Khadija (RA), the Prophet's first wife, was known for her kindness, charity, and successful business dealings. Haajar (AS) showed extraordinary determination in finding water for her son Ismail. Umm-Ayman (RA) was like a mother to the Prophet and Asiya (AS) was like a mother to Musa. These outstanding mothers serve as role models for all mothers.

In a Hadith, we learn that the quickest path to Jannah is by being kind to our mothers. Jannah lies under our mother's feet as long as we honor, respect, and serve her to the best of our ability. We should be particularly eager to serve our parents when they have reached old age and need more of our help.

How should we deal with our mothers?

To be kind to one's parents is to obey them, except in matters forbidden by Allah. Even if parents are difficult, showing respect and kindness is necessary. Mistreating or disrespecting parents is a major sin in Islam. If issues arise, seeking mediation or making dua for understanding is advised. The rights of parents are incomparable, and no matter how much we do for them, we can never fully repay their sacrifices.
